Jerry's Thoughts



We often think of Henry Ford when we think of our A models. So I thought I might put down some facts on paper just to highlight some of the many things Henry did before the A was even thought about. Born about the time of the Civil War, he remained a virtual unknown until he was about forty, really just a back yard mechanic tinkering with building a Quadricycle. He had little business training. It wasn't until he became a professional race car driver, breaking land speed records, that he became well known.

Ford Motor Company was born about this time in 1903. Ford became successful even before the T with the Model N. This car sold well, but was pricy at about \$700. Ford envisioned everyone; just ordinary people should have affordable transportation to liberate them from the farm and the mills. It needed to be built well, be affordable, and easy to fix. Ford's constant tweaking of the assembly line and parts interchangeability brought the T's price down hundreds of dollars form its introductory price of around \$825. This price reduction allowed sales to climb over 100 percent per year, eventually allowing Ford to sell over 15 million of them before the A appeared in late 1927.

Even while the T was in production there were the war contracts where Ford plants were building hundreds of thousands of Jeeps (Willys) under contract, as well as thousands of B-24 Liberator bombers on his huge Willow Run assembly lines.

Henry turned over his presidency of the company to son Edsel in 1918, but did not relinquish complete control until he was nearly seventy, in 1930. Son Edsel had to strongly persuade his father the need for a new faster and better looking car in the late twenties. He waited too long to bring the A on line and in doing so, allowed other manufactures to take great chunks out of his sales with their better equipped and modern cars. This is one reason the A survived only four years until the V-8 appeared in 1932.

Ford Motor Company was capitalized with just a \$100,000 in 1903, then reorganized 16 years later for \$100,000,000! The company had 36 branches in the US, 33 of them assembly plants. Foreign plants, offices, and associated companies were around the world from Egypt to Brazil to Japan. The company sold only 1,708 cars its first year. During the next five years 25,000 Ford cars of various models were sold. It was just 7 years later (1915) the company hit one million cars. The New Model A Car was announced in November of 1927, and the first public showing happened on December 2 of that year. The public was stunned! And the rest is history!



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
