

Rare indeed the woman who has not hoped that some day such a car might be her very own. That dream, long cherished, may now come true. For the Ford Roadster, with all its beauty of line and mechanical excellence, is most conveniently priced. Many months of glorious motoring await your beckoning.




Speaking of the transmission causes me to think of the undercarriage. There were so many changes to the undercarriage throughout production that the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards (RGJS) devotes a full 22 pages to the subject, and that doesn't even include the information for VE28 and E28 cars!

Years ago, it seems everyone believed Henry Ford just painted everything glossy black on the undercarriage. Perhaps it was because their cars were so caked up with grease, they appeared black, or maybe it was just because it made the restoration process easier. The Judging Standards Committee has put hours of research in over the years, and since have determined nine different finishes that existed on the Model A undercarriage: Aluminum, Satin Black, Semi-Gloss Black, Gloss Black, Cadmium, Ford Engine Green, Raven, Unfinished, and Zinc.

Can you believe they had three different black paints? Some continue to be skeptical, but it makes sense to me. Some parts such as the frame were dipped and then baked with a quick drying black paint. While other parts like the battery support were dipped with slower drying black enamel (the same paint that was used on the fenders). Additionally, other parts were just left unfinished because it saved Henry Ford the price of the paint.

Whereas, more critical parts such as brake actuating parts were cadmium plated so they would last longer. For judging, the undercarriage is one of the hardest sections to judge, and it's worth a whopping 35 points out of 500. You can afford to have a couple of items be the wrong finish, but if you start to have a lot, you can lose points fast!

Obviously, 22 pages were of parts and finishes is too much to cover in one article, but below is a wonderful photograph of my dad's L28 Roadster front end. Incidentally, this front end passed with flying colors through judging. You can clearly see the unfinished drag link end and various unfinished nuts. You can also see cadmium plated grease zerks. How about the semi-gloss axle and the glossy black shock



link? I could go on and on with the details, but what's the saying? Something about a picture being worth a thousand words?

I'll leave you with this, a Model A with an undercarriage that is well maintained and painted all black can drive just a well as a car that is authentically restored with all the hardware the correct finish. I spend a lot of time running back and forth between where I'm painting parts and the RGJS to research finishes! However, I strive for my cars to become more authentic with each thing I do to them. I'm lucky enough to own several of these cars, and eventually I want to get to the point where I can honestly tell people it's "original" when they ask me at a gas station.





Nuts and Bolts

through Sapulpa on June 22, it has been rescheduled for August 24. Mark your calendars now and let's welcome the racers at noon at the Route 66 Auto Museum.

Mr. Leake, who operated the popular Leake Auto Show and Auction, recently passed way. Our club helped with the Leake Auction for several years. Fair winds, Mr. Leake.

Have you ever wondered why American drivers sit on the left side of the car and drive on the right side of the road? In 1792, on its newly established turnpike, Pennsylvania required buggy or wagon drivers to keep right. About a decade later, New York became the first state to mandate righthand travel on all public highways. As automobiles became more common at the turn of the century, safety became an issue. Many cars had the steering wheel on the right-hand side because it was easier for the drivers to keep an eye on the ditches and the sides of narrow bridges. That changed with the Ford Model T, which moved the steering wheel to the left. The 1909 brochure cited two benefits: letting a passenger exit at the curb and giving the driver a better view of oncoming traffic. Other automakers were inspired to follow suit when the Model T quickly became the best-selling car of the era. Thanks, Henry!

This corona virus has changed everyone's plans over the past few months and continues to challenge us all. Some of my friends had a trip planned in June to California to visit Jay Leno's Garage and the Petersen Automotive Museum. Very disappointing but we hope to go again next February.
