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

## The Finer Points


We've managed to get a few tours in recently, and it has been so nice to just go for a drive. Of course, I've been motoring away this whole time, but I understand some folks are hoping for a 500 miles award rather than the standard 1,000 miles award this year! While I was out motoring recently in my 1928 Roadster, I started to notice some issues. It was having symptoms very similar to vapor locking. I've driven the motorcar in the heat before without issue. Of course, everything on the fuel system is as stock as possible. Even the cast iron sediment bowl is original!

Since I was on the road, I opened up the GAV, and it started to alleviate my symptoms. I knew what that meant. Trash in the carburetor. When I first purchased this Roadster, it wouldn't start because ethanol fuel had evaporated leaving a residue behind that plugged up the jets. Now, my best guess was that trash from the fuel tank made its way into the carburetor. Upon opening it, I realized I was correct. Tiny particles of trash were blocking the jets.

No worries though! I had recently overhauled the engine, and it still looks brand new. However, I didn't restore the carburetor because I was too anxious to get back on the road. The Roadster had now presented me with the perfect opportunity to do a bit more restoration work on it.

Although all Model A carburetors are interchangeable, there are several variations by year. Finding the correct carburetor for your motorcar can be a bit of a challenge these days since a lot of them have been mismatched over the years. For my carburetor, it required a forged brass throttle shaft assembly and either a forged brass or steel air shutter valve (choke). Mine are pictured in Figure One. My levers are definitely usable; however, this is one problem. The judging standards state they were nickel plated originally, and mine are clearly not any longer!

Figure One: Nickel plating is not a passive process, but rather one of electrolysis meaning direct electric current is passed through a nickel plate through



a solution to the part being plated. Most people would not attempt this themselves opting to take the parts to a professional plater which can be costly. Believe it or not, plating kits are available for small items (or large if you're brave enough), and I think they are fairly easy to use with good results. The math required is nothing more than basic algebra, and although the science is complicated the instruction manuals dial it down nicely. Perhaps I should confess I have a degree in Biochemistry though. My one word of caution before venturing down this path yourself is the solutions tend to be a bit acidic. So, safety precautions need to be taken.

The brass parts are bead blasted, rinsed in a degreasing solution, and finally put into the plating solution seen in Figure Two. You can barely see the parts hanging down from the cathode in the solution. Figure Two:

After leaving in the solution for around an hour, the parts are removed and rinsed. The center of the throttle shaft assembly must be bead blasted again to show the copper shaft since originally the throttle lever and shaft were assembled after lever was plated. Talk about picky! Figure Three



shows the finished parts. Quite the change from the dull brass parts above, eh?

Figure Three: Now, all that was left was to restore the rest of the carburetor! Figure Four shows the finished carburetor.

The nickel plating really makes those two parts pop! Since I only covered two of the many parts used on the Model A carburetor, I guess I have a lot more to cover! This seems picky, but now my carburetor matches my restored motor, and it was a fun project. Now, all that's left is the rest of the car!

Our 1929 Model A Leatherback was bought by my Great Grandfather, Andrew Jackson Sanders, on April 1, 1929, in Southwest City, Mo. His wife, my Great grandmother, was Addie Sanders. We named the car for her.



Using the owner's manual and a book on How to Drive a Model A. Great Grandpa took it out in the pasture and tried to learn to drive it. He decided he was not that into it (He was 77 years young at the time). So family history goes that my Great Uncle Herman used it in the evenings to go honky-tonking and my Great Aunt Elsa drove it in the day time to the school where she taught elementary classes. Both were single and living at home just outside of town. As a young child I remember going to my Great Grandparents home for fish fries. They had three spring fed ponds with gates in them to separate the different kinds of fish. During the gatherings, most everyone spent a lot of time fishing. Fishing was not interesting to me so I would get in a cool spot and read or I would go upstairs and look at the books in his small library. I also remember the Model A sitting in a small garage next to the house with chickens roosting on it.

The car stayed in the garage until the middle 80's. That is when my Aunt Patty acquired it and she had someone in Kansas restore it, new interior and new paint. They kept it for many years just driving it inside the gated community where they lived in Texas. They never took trips in it as we are doing now. When they were in their late 80's, they called and said they weren't able to keep it up anymore and decided to sell it. We were not sure if we wanted it or not and talked to Don Reed about it and what would be a good price. We finally decided we wanted to keep it in the family and bought it from them. We hooked up a trailer July 4, 2010 and went to Grove, where they were living on Grand Lake, loaded it up and brought it home (hard to believe we have had it that long). Shortly after the purchase, Don and Jesse Reed invited us to the Tulsa Model A meeting and we joined the club at that meeting. New people get convinced to run for the Board and I became the Treasurer and Ollie handled the drinks.

Ollie did some mechanical work on it to make it more driveable, adding an air conditioner and turn signals and moved the seat back as these cars were not made for big guys. It still has its original glass, headlights and other parts I am not sure of. And, I have the original title and the little booklet that came with the Model A.

We plan for the car to remain in the family, eventually going to Ryan Ford, our only grandson. Like me, Ryan is interested in family history. When he was a young, he went with me exploring cemeteries looking for old headstones of our ancestors. He has promised to leave it as-is, not turn it into a hot rod! May Ms. Addie live long and prosper!
