THE FINER POINTS

The national MARC meet at Oshkosh flew by! The swap meet was great, and renewing friendships with old friends was fun, but the best part was fine point, of course! Dad's January 1929 Roadster did extremely well, and scored 487 out of 500 possible points. It is quite difficult to obtain the Henry Ford award, but we got there! There are actually three separate awards shown below: MARC of Excellence, Master Restoration



Award, and the Henry Ford Award. Perhaps at a later date, we can delve into the differences.

It is particularly fascinating to me how the production of our beloved Model "A's" changed throughout production particularly in 1928. When restoring a car, it is the details that make all the difference. For instance, did you know the door bumpers had several changes throughout production on Roadsters and Phaetons? That's right, I said "several changes" even though the major parts suppliers just show two changes: '28-29 bumpers and '30-31 bumpers. The earliest cars did not have bumpers between the cowl and door. This must have

caused some rattles and frustration for early owners. In particular, the owner of A2292 must have been unhappy enough that the letter shown on theis page was written addressing this issue. Incidentally, the motor A2292 was produced on December 14, 1927. So, this is a very early 1928.

The Roadster was only five months old when it was brought back to the dealer with this complaint. Isn't it interesting that the letter tells them exactly where to install the bumpers? Fast forward to August of 1928 when my original unrestored Roadster was being produced, and guess what? The bumpers were still being installed exactly as described in the Ford letter. How often do you see original bumpers? Not to mention the original door check strap!

Please acknowledge receipt of this letter, advising that you have made the installation of these parts as instructed.

FORD MOTOR COMPANY

AND NOW THE REST OF THE STORY. . .

On June 16, 1903, Henry Ford founded the Ford Motor Company. This was not his first rodeo, as he had previously operated the Henry Ford Company. He left that company and took his name with him. What became of the Henry Ford Company? It became known as the Cadillac Motor Company. I know you already knew this, but what does any of this have to do with the photo of a BBQ grill? Hang on.

Ford's Model T, which would number in the millions sold, required 100 board feet of wood to build. Ford despised waste. His motto was, "Reduce, reuse, and recycle." He was also a nature-lover, an environmentalist of his time. His escape from the stress of life was camping in the great outdoors.

Frustrated by the mountains of sawdust his lumber mills created, he and his partners sought a way to utilize the scrap wood and sawdust into a useful (and profitable) product.

An idea came to him one day as he was camped with some friends in the wilds of Michigan. After his party spent a long time collecting sufficient wood for a campfire, an idea spring in Ford's mind. Upon returning back to the lumber mill, he shared the idea with some of his partners and set to work on it.

The idea? Lumping a fistful of sawdust and cornstarch with a bit of tar to form a briquette. After charring it, it performed exactly what Ford imagined it would. He then built a charcoal briquette factory adjacent to his lumber mill where the waste from one became the fuel for the other.

A new Model T was now frequently sold with a bonus bag of Ford Charcoal Briquettes, so you could drive into the woods to camp and not worry about finding campfire wood.

So now you know. Ford not only created the modern automobile industry which takes millions to work and back each workday, but he also created the weekend grilling and camping industries.

In 1951, the Ford Charcoal Briquette Company was sold. The new company was named after Ford's real estate partner who helped him find the land to supply wood for building the early Ford automobiles: E.J. Kingsford. Today Kingsford Charcoal is the largest producer of charcoal briquettes in the world.



THE FINER POINTS CONTINUED

Apparently, Mr. Henry Ford thought two bumpers for this area were one too many because by the time my Dad's Roadster body was being produced in November/December 1928, the lower bumper had been deleted.

It seems that for the rest of production, Henry was happy with the bumper situation between the cowl and door on his Roadsters. Below is a photo of my February 1930 Roadster bumper. The lower hinge changed in July 1930 from the two-hole type to the three mounting hole type. There were other changes to the other bumpers around the doors, but I think this is enough detail for one article. Ha! You can also see quite clearly the difference in interior trim between the three models. Participating in the fine point process is definitely an exciting experience, but the MARC national meets are just fun in general.





You will see things at the national meets that are extremely rare such as the 1927 prototype chassis that was on display. It's one of only two known to exist, and the second one is not complete. Another example is the dealer letter one of the guys in the early 1928 special interest group brought to show. The envelope for this letter was post marked "DEC 5 7PM 1927". So, very few complete cars had been produced by this time. My favorite quote is, "Your biggest thrill will come when you slip in behind the wheel and drive this car yourself," because it is still my biggest thrill today.

The Forgotten Accessory

"From its place as simply a useful accessory, the decorative pin has become a most important detail of dress. It still performs the old function of enhancing the beauty of the person and adding distinction and dignity, but today it does more than that. The jeweled pin or bracelet, appropriately worn, forms the last in the perfection of the completed costume." -1928 Baird-North Jewelry catalog.

When we think of Model A era jewelry, what comes to mind? Necklaces are usually at the top of the list, closely followed by earrings and bracelets. But how often do you think about wearing a brooch or pin? The jewelry catalogs of the time have pages and pages devoted to pins of all types. The materials range from platinum and diamonds to paste and pot metal. There are cameos, mosaics, gemstones, pearls, and even coral and jade.

So why such a dearth in visibility? One of the reasons we tend to overlook this jewelry is its size. Pins and brooches are relatively small and do not show up well in pictures. I didn't realize this fact until I started researching the subject and quickly noticed how hard it was to find pictures with these details. With a lot of searching, I was able to round up a few pictures of ladies wearing pins for this article. Most of these are from advertisements or movie magazines.
