
The clues were very clever and the tour was well planned! The 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners all received cash awards.

## MEN'S COFFEE SPONSORED BIG BOY TRIP

The Tulsa Model A Ford Club met in Broken Arrow at the Quik Trip, 81st and OK51 to travel to Wagoner OK to meet up with the Union Pacific "Big Boy" No 4014 a 1.2 million pound 132 feet long steam locomotive. There were 25 Big Boy Locomotives built for the Union Pacific and No 4014 was delivered to Union Pacific in December 1941.

These locomotives were used to conquer The Wasatch Grade. The locomotives, capable of pulling



100 car trains across the high plains and mountain passes of the American west at 70+ mph.

Starting at 4,298 feet elevation in Ogden, Utah traveling eastward the grade climbs to 6,799 feet at Wasatch station, five miles west of the Utah-Wyoming state line. That's a 2501 feet elevation in a distance of 65 miles, an average climb of 38.47 feet per mile. That's the Wasatch Grade! Eight still survive and No 4014 is the only one operational. Union Pacific reacquired No 4014 in 2013 to begin a multi-year restoration. No 4014 was returned to service in May of 2019.

Much like the Big Boy, 6 Model A's were "chugging" alongside tracks from Broken Arrow to Wagoner to see the Big Boy. We stopped at the Wagoner Quik Trip and picked up a couple more Model A's. Then on too 5th St and Jackson Ave via Rail Road Blvd. After a short unplanned drive through a scrap metal yard (sorry about the mud puddle), we found a place to watch the Big Boy arrive. Lots of people from Wagoner and the surrounding area were with us to welcome the Big Boy. Many of the spectators placed coins on the tracks to take away a souvenir of the occasion. The Big Boy promptly smashed them all.

It was good to see all club members and to travel together and allow everyone to see our cars. We had plenty of time to visit as the Big Boy was about thirty minutes late. He did arrive however and everyone knew it. With the bell clanging and the steam whistle blowing, there could be no doubt Big Boy had arrived! The Big



Boy was in Wagoner for about 20 minutes and was much enjoyed by all.

If there is one thing Model A owners share with the Big Boy, it would be the passion to preserve history, and that restoration means a lot of hard work... perseverance and preservation go hand in hand to keep history a living thing.

Thanks to the Men's Coffee group for helping set this tour up. A special thanks to Rich Robinson for his help with planning this trip.

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## THE FINER POINTS

We are still in the heat of summer which I believe means it's a great time to drive the Roadsters! We recently had a great meeting in which we discussed the perils of using original and four blade fans on the cars we drive. For the sake of those that attended, I won't repeat the discussion other than to say you oughtn't to use them. If you have not been attending the meetings, I would like to encourage you to do so. It is always fun to see everyone.

This may seem contradictory, but when building a Fine Point car, you must use an original fan. It is important to remember the objective of Fine Point is to bring the car back to as close as what it would have looked like rolling off the factory floor in Dearborn. It seems crazy to me, but there are not even variances given for assembly plants. I suppose there are just too many unknowns. Dad's Roadster was assembled in the Denver plant, and when we first started looking at it there were several earlier parts that were outside the two-month limit for parts. The two-month limit in the Standards says that a part can be used for up to two months on a car after the replacement part was put into service. Luckily, there are some parts that do not vary greatly from year to year. Fans are an excellent example of this.

These are two original fans. The initial fan design (pictured on the right) was produced by Ford and was double thickness. It was spot welded along the edges. On a nice original fan that will pass Fine Point, you should be able to see the spot welds. Below is a photograph of the typical spot welds along the left side of the photo. This style of fan was used throughout all years of production.





In July 1930, an engineering drawing was released for a single thickness fan produced by Holley. There were two variations of this style. Initially, the new design called for a large radius on the back where the single thickness blade was attached. This large radius was eliminated in late 1930. Below is a photo of the later style radius. This fan was used in conjunction with the

initial design throughout the remainder of production.



All fans were painted with black enamel. Additionally, the castle nut which secures the fan was also black enamel. The cotter pin was unfinished. Historically, castle nuts with rounded grooves were considered 1928-1929 while square cut grooves were considered 1930-1931. The standards very clearly state that square cut grooves began appearing in 1930 and were used predominantly by 1931. To me, this means that a 1930 car could have rounded groove castle nuts installed particularly if it is an early 1930 car. I am working on a way to tell which groove the fan nut has while the motor is running, but I haven't perfected it yet!
