If you have yet to pay your club dues, now is the time!


I, for one, am looking forward to a fun year with lots of motoring ahead. Let us all strive for a positive year! President Chris DuVall

The Finer Points

I hope everyone had a very Merry Christmas and received lots of good new loot for their Model "A"! It is definitely the off season for swap meets, and I'm still dreaming of our first trip to Hershey last year. I continue to be blown away by the sheer volume and rarity of some of the parts. A friend of ours, Bob Martino, actually found an original open car aluminum rear window frame. If you didn't catch that, I said "aluminum." It's hard to express just how rare a frame like this is. Ford only used aluminum frames on open cars from the beginning of production through January 1928. By the end of January, only 0.36% of engines had been produced and stamped. Around 19% of Model "A" Fords were Roadsters or Phaetons in 1928. So, perhaps 3,200 of the first open cars would have had the aluminum frame. Rare! Bob is going to use the frame on his prototype Roadster he is currently building for Fine Point.

When it comes to the prototype car, I'm not sure how useful the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards are! However, for the rest of us, it continues to be a great wealth of information. Even so, it does occasionally fall short in details when describing some parts. For instance, Area 12: Interior Trim has a lot of factory photos, but it can be difficult to glean the details of certain items such as door handles for open cars. The only detailed photos we have are actually drawings someone provided long ago on page 12-10. There were three variations of handles used throughout production on the open cars. The first style can be a bit hard to find, but I was able to find three pairs at Hershey. Perhaps not as good of a score as Bob's frame, but still excellent considering I only paid four bits a piece for them! Of course, they need to be re-nickeled, but I think I know someone who can handle that. They were originally bright nickel-plated brass.



The above knob was used on open cars without exterior door handles which would generally be the 1928 models. The next two photos compare an original knob

to a reproduction knob. As you can clearly see, the reproduction would do the job, but it is not anywhere close to the look of the original.



It seems to be a little fuzzy on when Ford actually changed over to produce the 1929 open car body styles; however, by at least December 1928, Ford had replaced the knobs with the new handles for the new 1929 bodies. The new style was used throughout the rest of production with only one change beginning in mid-1930. The handle on top is an original for 1929 through early 1930 that has been restored. As you can see, they were nickel plated whereas the reproduction on bottom is chrome.



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The next photo shows the side view of the two handles. Look how curved the right end is on the original and how stubby the end is on the reproduction. There is a reason for this. Beginning in mid-1930, Ford made the end stubby on purpose to allow more clearance between the handle and the door panel. Interestingly, this change was made before the introduction of the DeLuxe Roadster later in the year. They must have been planning ahead because the DeLuxe has a padded door panel that requires more clearance. Before the DeLuxe models were introduced, the door panels were vinyl wrapped cardboard without padding.



Once installed, the reproduction handles look close enough that most would not be able to tell they are not original (unless they are installed on a "standard" car and there is a huge gap between the end and the door panel). Still there is one easy way to tell if a reproduction is installed. Originals are seamed on the back! In the next photo, the seam is clearly seen. More importantly, the judges will feel for the seam while judging. If they don't feel the seam, you get half points for your handle and that if you had it nickeled instead of chromed!



As I mentioned above, the last design for open car interior handles had the shorter stubby end, and I just happen to have an NOS one to show off. It doesn't get better than NOS, right? The original nickel plating is still in place although it could use a little polishing, and you can see what the original stubby end is supposed to look like. Additionally, you can see where the nickel cover was bent around an unfinished steel piece. I have seen original style handles that are stainless clad rather than nickel plated; however, the standards specify the handles were nickel plated. Perhaps the stainless ones were used at the very last of production or perhaps they were replacement parts.





If you have a Roadster or Phaeton, go check out your interior door handles to see if they are originals. If not, then dream about swaps until you're able to find them!
