The Finer Points

Do you know what the best part of owning a Model "A" Ford is? It's the fact that you always have something to work on! Ha! Dad and I have been continuing to work on our February 1929 Special Coupe, and I have been sneaking in a little time for my May 1931 project and my original unrestored August 1928 Roadster. Specifically, we've been working in Area 5: The Exhaust System. With ten points and only four pages, this section is not too difficult; however, there is still quite a bit of detail that must be just right.


There were only two designs of the exhaust manifold. The first design was used from the beginning of production through March 1931. So, this layout was used on both the 1928 and 1929 cars that we are working on. Below is a photo of the 1929 exhaust. Originally, these were unfinished; however, in the interest of preservation, heat resistant paint may be used.




Isn't she beautiful?! I think so too! How do we know this is an original for our Fine Point car? One give away is the casting number on the left side above where the clamp would be. Most originals have either a number or a letter in this area. Snyder's does make a really nice reproduction exhaust manifold, and they put the letter "S" here. From the next photo below, you can also see some additional details of the motor such as the original bolts and lock washers.



It is easy to get distracted by the level of detail in these photos; nevertheless, let's try to stay focused on the exhaust system. In the next photo, you can see that the exhaust studs are dome shaped. This style of stud was used from the beginning of production through February 1929. So, our Special Coupe barely makes the cut for these. Starting in March, the stud end was flat. Additionally, we have painted the studs and the washers with the same heat resistant paint as the manifold. The nuts could have been either cadmium or zinc plated. We decided to use cadmium. You can barely see the edges of the copper clad asbestos gasket. They also could have been clad in brass. This style was made in two pieces and was introduced in January 1929 and used through May 1931.



In the next photo, we can see two additional details: the white asbestos and the raised delta mark. The delta was generally in this area, and most manifolds had them. Reproductions do not have the delta marks.

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So, what makes a 1928 car different? The difference is in the manifold gaskets. From the beginning of production to January 1929, six steel glands were used with six individual copper or brass clad asbestos gaskets. Below is a photo showing my original 1928 Roadster as I prepared to install the correct gasket. See the six individual gland rings? Later motors were not machined to accept a gland ring in the intake port. On a side note, Ford removed the provision for gland rings on motors produced between 1/20/1929 and 3/15/1929. Our Special Coupe's motor was made on February 19, 1929. So, it is not machined for any gland rings. After this time period, gland rings were used on exhaust ports only. If you are interested in finding out when your motor was produced, you can at www. modelahouse.com.



The next photo shows the installed 1928 gaskets. The difference from the 1929 version is easy to spot. On a side note, Dad's January 1929 motor also has this style of gaskets, and he received full credit for them since it's within the two-month rule.



Beginning in March 1931, Ford introduced a new reinforced manifold. Other than the reinforcement, the features were the same as the earlier design. Below is a photo of the reinforced area of my 1931 manifold, and you can see the casting number. Interestingly, this manifold does not have the delta mark. I also have the muffler clamp already attached with correct bolts and nuts so I won't lose it. The muffler clamp was unchanged throughout production. The bolts and nuts had fine threads until August 1929 when the threads were changed to coarse. The clamp and bolts were originally unfinished but painted with high temperature paint here for preservation. All the nuts were brass originally. Lock washers were not used.


