The Finer Points By Chris Duval

As everyone knows, there is an endless number of things to debate on the Model "A" Ford. If one asks a question on Facebook, it is common to receive well over 100 opinions from only 50 people. If I had a dime for every time someone told me the Model "A" Ford only came in black, I'd be a wealthy man! If we can't rely on Facebook, what can we rely on? Luckily, we have the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards. Undoubtedly, this is the most comprehensive guide for restoring a single model of car that exists on the market today.

Due to persistent rumors, incorrectly remembered facts, and just plain old misinformation, there seems to exist a certain amount of skepticism about the accuracy of the Standards. So, how do we know they are accurate? The first thing to remember is they are compiled by volunteers who love the Model "A" just as much as we do. Second, these volunteers spend their own time and money to travel to the Benson Ford Research Center to reference original documents and blueprints. These primary source documents are then reviewed by the Judging Standards Committee (the JSC) to determine if they qualify for

entry into the Standards.

When Dad first
purchased his January
1929 Roadster, it was an
original unrestored car
with only 56,000 miles on
it. As you can see below,
many, many years had
passed since anyone had
done anything to the
engine on this car. If you
look closely, you can see
the letter "B" embossed
on the head indicating a
high compression head.

Obviously, we were not Fine Point people when we started the restoration of this motorcar; however, we wanted to put the car back exactly as it came. As a result, we restored the "B" head and installed it on the car.



Sometime later we decided to try for Fine Point with the restoration. This meant a lot of research to determine what was correct, and this was particularly challenging since we were already part way through the restoration. At some point, I was reading through Area 1: Engine Compartment thinking we should be good to go since we put it back the way it came. Right? Wrong! On page 1-2, the Standards indicate the "B" head was not available until April 1931 a couple of years after Dad's Roadster was produced. This fact is

also repeated in Area 16: Accessories. So, we believed the Standards and switch the "B" head to a standard head, and the rest is history on Dad's Henry car.

Nevertheless, how do we know the Standards are correct? Allow me to present two primary source documents that support what the Standards state. Below is part of a letter from the Chicago Branch of Ford Motor Company dated March 13, 1931. As you can see, they are specifying that only police departments are to be sold the model "B" head. Perhaps someone could have cheated and gotten a "B" head on their car before this date, but that certainly was not the intent of Ford Motor Company.





In order to install this spring, it is necessary to move the rear spring front shackle bracket AL-5775-A forward 12-5/8" using Spring Clips AL-5705-E with AL-5560-E Spring. We do not mean that this spring should be used without first carefully analyzing the situation to definitely ascertain the necessity of this softer spring action and to make certain that the load will not be too heavy for this particular spring.

HIGH SPEED CYLINDER HZ.D
We find that our dealers are making innumerable requests for high speed cylinder heads without submitting sufficient bone fide evidence of the fact that they are to be used only for police work, and it will therefore, be necessary that we require each order for high speed heads, to be accompanied by a requisition of the police authority on the police department letterhead or requisition form.

Next is another letter from the Chicago Branch dated April 3, 1931.

WEIGHT SERVICE LETTER

In checking complaints of poor gas mileage, or lack of speed in the Model A Car, we have found in practically every instance, these complaints are due to improper timing and incorrect specing of the distributor points or spark plug point gaps. We have also found in questioning dealers' shop foremen, superintendents and mechanics, a general lack of knowledge as to the correct clearances for these settings. We, therefore, direct your attention to Page 542 of the February Service Bulletin, showing the distributor points as correctly set .018 to .022 and spark plug point gaps properly set at .035. It will be very much to your advantage to question your own shop men to determine whether or not they are familiar with this clearance and to further ascertain whether your savantage to question your own shop men to determine whether or not they are familiar with this clearance and to further ascertain whether or not they know how to properly time a motor. It is very important in timing a motor that the distributor body be installed and that the rotor arm is opposite number one contact in the distributor body as outlined on Page 480 of the August 1930 Service Bulletin, and also on Page 346 of the May 1929 Service Bulletin. These instructions should be reviewed from time to time, as this will assist considerably in the rendering

HIGH COMPRESSION CILINGER HEADS Numerous requests have been received for the supplying of a high speed cylinder head for individual owner's use as well as for police work. We have in the past, however, preferred to supply these heads for police work only as when operating the car equipped with this head, the driver must exercise care in order to avoid an objectionable head, the driver must exercise care in order to avoid an objectionable "pinging" noise. The engine also is not quite as smooth in general operation using this high speed head as with the standard head. We, therefore, felt that it would not be advisable to sell these heads gazerally to the public. We will, however, supply the high compression cylinder heads in special cases where an owner particularly desires it, and fully unior—stands in advance, the above mentioned conditions and will take the necessary precention to properly use the spark lever. The price effective immediately on A-6050-B High Compression Cylinder Head will be \$5.50 and the Gasket A-6051-B will be \$3.50. Recommended labor charge for the installation of this head would be \$1.50 making a total charge to the customer of \$7.35. We want it distinctly understood, however, that the obligation is placed upon you in selling this head to impress upon the obligation is placed upon you in selling this head to impress upon the owner the above outlined conditions. It is also very important that care be exercised in properly timing the motor when installing this



How about that? Ford Motor Company blessed the selling of high compression "B" heads to the general public starting in April just like the Standards say. These are the types of documents the JSC uses to determine when items were available on the Model "A". Hopefully I'm not the only one who thinks information like this is fascinating! I do think there is an even more important lesson to be had here though. Next time you're taking your car over to Marvin to have him change the head gasket, tell him you want him to abide by the Ford authorized labor charge of \$1.50!

Bill Knight Updates Club on Auto Industry by Ken Brust

Bill Knight has supported our club in various ways over the past several years. We had asked him to update us on Ford and the auto industry back well before Covid interfered with everyone's scheduling. But we finally were able to set a date with him to meet with us.

He walked us through the challenges not only Ford but all auto manufacturers are dealing with. There are the many environmental issues along which have introduced trends toward electric vehicles (EV) and admitted that things may not be resolved for several years. Chips are rare and expensive to make, battery materials are difficult to obtain, battery life needs to be greatly extended, charging stations need to be plentiful, supply chains need to be streamlined, environmental issues resolved, alternative energy issues still to be explored and various additional challenges still to be managed.

He noted that his dealerships operate totally different than before when Covid seemed to cause everything to go crazy. Where he used to have 40+ new vehicles for customers to touch and feel and to pick out a model, now he is fortunate to have four. Most sales are now ordered with specifics selected by the buyer after viewing models and options on electronic displays and then they play the waiting game. There doesn't seem to be any clear definition as to how long a wait might be for a new vehicle. Used vehicle prices have steeply climbed and are also difficult to find. But Bill said he is adapting to the many changes and is optimistic for the future, whatever it might end up being. He has driven the EVs and says they are very exciting. Quiet, balanced from front to back, lots of torque (but harder on the tires), less moving parts so easier to maintain. However, finding technicians to maintain these new, complex vehicles is a constant challenge and quite different from maintaining a Model A.

Everyone in attendance thoroughly enjoyed Bill's program. We complimented him for his presentation by presenting him with a certificate of appreciation. Bill has offered to host a car show or other activity at his dealership later this Fall for our Club when it is a tad cooler. He says he has "plenty" of space now!

Jim's Tech Tips

"Mounting Wheels"

I know that my Dad reads these Tech Tips, so today's is a special shout out to him, who taught me this Tip for mounting wheels when I was about 12 years old. Thanks, Dad!

Start with a classic X-style lug nut wrench. If you don't already have one, mine is 20" across and works quite well.

Place the wheel/tire next to the vehicle, leaning it against the hub and brake drum you plan to mount it on. Adjust the jack so that the wheel needs to be lifted an inch or two onto the studs.



Now slip two of the tire iron arms under the tire, one arm to the left of where the tire touches the ground, and the other arm to the right. Grab one of the tire iron arms that is pointing out toward you, and lift the tire up with one hand while you guide the wheel to hang on a stud or two with the other hand.



Hold the wheel in against the drum while you lower the lug wrench and use that free hand to start a lug nut on one of the studs. Once you have that lug nut started, you can let go of the wheel and start the rest of them. Use the tire iron to run them all in snug, then lower the jack and tighten them all again.

This Tip is not just applicable to mounting a wheel/tire on a Model A. It works on pretty much any vehicle: car, truck, trailer... In fact, the larger and heavier the wheel/tire is that you are putting on, the bigger help this is.

So in the shop or out on the road, use a simple tire iron to help you lift a wheel up into place and hold it there while you start the lug nuts.
