
before, I would recommend it since it fits in perfectly with the time period of our cars.

The Finer Points By Chris Duval

I've been working away on the 400-A Convertible Sedan project. The motor was rebuilt years ago and never run; nevertheless, it needed to be disassembled so the finishes could be brought up to current Standards. I don't want to brag too much, but I think everything I have for the car is beautiful. Before I put any part on, I'm double and triple checking the Standards to make sure it's absolutely correct. The 400-A is a June 1931 car. I've also been working on a May 1931 motor for my DeLuxe Roadster project. You would think being so late in production that all of the finishes would be the same, right? Not to mention that since the motors are only a month apart that they should be exactly the same. Such assumptions are not good assumptions when restoring a car. Below is an example of the water inlets for both motors.



The castings are both Ford Engine Green despite the shading differences in the different batches of Bill Hersch paint. The lock washers are unfinished, and the clips are "black enamel". So, the only other difference can be the bolt. Technically, both of these parts are Mid 1931. Starting in Mid 1931, the finish on the bolt was changed from black enamel to raven finish. The left inlet has a raven finished bolt while the right has a black enamel bolt. The Standards specify a two-month rule that allowed Ford to use up their inventory of parts. I guess for the May 1931 motor, I decided to take advantage of the two-month rule and paint the bolt black when I was fixing the part. That would not have been okay for my June 1931 400-A though. So, it's a good thing I double checked, and didn't just do what I did before! Little details like this can add up quickly when the car is being judged.

The 400-A came with a restored popout switch and locking door handle. Unfortunately, they were

keyed differently. Beginning in March 1931, all cars used the same key for all locks. June 1931 is slightly past the two-month rule for the changeover. Luckily, a friend of mine from California had just the thing I need: a pair of NOS keys and an NOS cylinder. How cool is that, right? Below is a photo of the keys and cylinder.



True 1931 parts can be difficult to find since the depression was in full swing, and production was lower. I mean has anyone tried to find an NOS clutch pedal for a 1931? Good luck! Getting back on track, there is one other aspect of a 1931 key cylinder that is mentioned in the Standards. Beginning in April, the key number was relocated from the bezel to the face of the lock cylinder. Before this time, the key number was easily viewed when the cylinder was popped out. So, this cylinder is perfect for my June car. The below photo shows where the key number was relocated.



FUN FACTS:

By February 4, 1929, one million Model As had been sold, and by July 24, two million. The range of body styles ran from the Tudor at US\$500 (in grey, green, or black) to the town car with a dual cowl at US\$1,200.

In March 1930, Model A sales hit three million, and there were nine body styles available. Prices for the Model A ranged from US\$385 for a roadster to US\$1,400 for the top-of-the-line town car.

LABOR'S FIRST HOLIDAY

THE BIGGEST PARADE II HAS EVER HAD.

HONORED SOMEWHAT IN THE BREACH BY BUSINESS MEN, BUT IN THE OB-SERVANCE BY WORKMEN.

Labor Day was honored in this city yesday more in the breach than in the observance. The variation of a large and miscellaneous parade served only to impress on the public at large so far as could be observed, the unfitness of the season for a general holiday. Of course many stores were closed and there were vast numbers of people on the streets.

But business slept with an eye open, and behind the closed iron shutters in the wholesale district, which was apparently the one most scriously affected, clerks were as busy as at any time for the past week, trying to catch up with orders, and any purchaser who chose to edge his way within by way of the freight entrance

But it took several more years for the federal government to make it a national holiday — when it served a greater political purpose. In the late 1800s, many Americans toiled 12 hours a day, seven days a week, often in physically demanding, low-paying jobs. Children worked too, on farms and in factories and mines. Conditions were often harsh and unsafe.

Working people began organizing and bargaining collectively to advocate for better working conditions and wages and celebrated the first Labor Day in New York City on Tuesday, September 5, 1882. Following the deaths of 13 workers during the Pullman Strike in June of 1894, President Grover Cleveland made reconciliation with the labor movement a top priority of his administration, making Labor Day a federal holiday in 1894.
