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






PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

THE FINER POINTS



It's been busy so far this year, but I have still managed to squeeze in a bit of Model "A" time here and there. In fact, I have continued working on my original and unrestored August 1928 Roadster. I am hoping to show this car at the MARC national meet in Ashville, NC later this year. Whenever I'm working on my motorcars, I am always comparing them.

When looking at my driver 1928 Roadster, the bumper clamps say "Ford". Of course, the clamps on that car are reproductions. Is anyone really surprised? Ha! Below is an example of a pair of originals. These clamps were only used as rear clamps from the beginning of production through May of 1928.



As you can see, the recessed areas are very shallow. When Ford redesigned the early clamps the increased the depth of the recessed area. In the photo at the top of the next column, you can see how much deeper the recess is. The recess was shallow on both the front and rear clamps in early 1928.



This photo is an odd ball that you don't run across every day: An early Canadian rear bumper clamp! Notice how the only recessed area is around the "Ford" script. Who knows this may be the beginnings of a new car for me!

What Happened to Model "U" Ford?


