Lately it has felt like spring is on the way. We have been working away on my original Roadster in an effort to be able to show her off in Ashville later this year at the MARC national meet. My car is considered to be a mid-1928 since it was produced in August; however, it still managed to retain some of the earlier features. One feature my car retained was early hub caps. According to the standards, early hub caps were used from the beginning of production through July 1928. Of course, don't forget parts could have been used up to two months after they went out of service.

There were actually four different types of early hub caps: "R", "W", star, and plain. The four different trademarks designated four manufacturers. What is most interesting to me, is the variation in the "Ford" script and the font for "MADE IN U.S.A." Upon closer inspection, an additional ring around the "R" hub cap is visible (upper left). Also, the period after the "A" in "U.S.A." is not always highly visible.

From June to August of 1928, Ford utilized hub caps with the same shape that omitted the "MADE IN U.S.A." These hub caps are quite rare and hard to find. Beginning in September, Ford introduced the hub caps that were used throughout 1929. Below is a photo of six NOS 1929 caps.



To me, it is interesting that even into 1929 there was variety in the Ford script. Also, you may notice a difference in the color and sheen of the 1929 caps. That's because all six of the 1929 caps are chrome plated rather than nickel. Beginning in April 1929, Ford began using chrome plated hub caps alongside nickel plated caps. Additionally, no trademarks are present on the 1929 hub caps.

I do love original parts, but nice original hub caps are becoming increasingly hard to find. Then again, isn't that true for all parts? It is good to know that A&L is reproducing all the styles of hub caps previously discussed. They really do an excellent job, and if you are restoring your car, it is definitely worth the extra money to have excellent looking hub caps.

Tulsa Model A Ford Club March 2nd Breakfast and Tours

March 2, 2024, breakfast will be at The Silver Skillet at 8:30 a.m., located at 8228 East 61st Street, Tulsa (CROSS STREET 61ST AND MEMORIAL). Following breakfast, we will drive downtown Tulsa to tour two of Tulsa's iconic churches, First Presbyterian and Boston Avenue Methodist. Our Docent, Ronda Falkensten, will guide us through these churches. The tour will start at 10:30 a.m. with each church taking about 1 hour. The cost is \$5 per person for the Docent, payable at breakfast. We hope you will join us for breakfast and our tours. Since the tours are inside, we will have them rain or shine. Parking will be available in the churches' parking lots for easy entry.

Background of the churches:

First Presbyterian Church known today as "First Church" (709 S Boston Ave, Tulsa)

The First Presbyterian Church of Tulsa was organized in 1885 in Creek Nation, Indian Territory, before statehood. It originally met in the store owned by brothers James M. Hall and Harry C. Hall, and was served by itinerant, circuit-riding ministers. Its first building was wooden, built in 1899. First Presbyterian was the very first organized Church in the city. The history of "First Church" is rich, and its roots are deep. You will be in awe of this gothic structure.

Boston Avenue Methodist Church (1301 South Boston Avenue, Tulsa)

Founded in 1893, Boston Avenue United Methodist Church (building was completed in 1929) is an historic, theologically progressive church. It is one of the few Art Deco churches that exists in the world and is considered to be one of the finest examples of Art Deco.
