


Arrow. Linda Mellage will be leading us in the parade.

Spring is here and there are lots of activities planned to enjoy the weather, the cars, and most importantly the fellowship of all our Model A friends.



#### THE FINER POINTS


I don't know about you, but I've been spending as much time in the Model "A" as possible. I'm trying to make up for not driving my DeLuxe Roadster very much over the last few years. Additionally, I've been working to get the ride to feel smoother like my other Model "A's". My Deluxe Roadster has reproduction hydraulic shock absorbers on it, and overall, they work well. In fact, I think they perform better than modern shocks since the hydraulic shocks were designed specifically for the cars. The needle valve is fully adjustable just like on the originals providing a soft or stiff ride as desired. What if you want original shocks though? What are some things to look for?

Area 23 of the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards outlines all the styles of shock absorbers used on the Model "A" except for the very first one. Below is a photo of the first Houdaille shock style used exclusively on the prototype cars. If you look closely, you'll see the shock is mounted on the frame horn next to the bumper arm, and the bottom of the link attached directly to the front axle. Obviously, this shock was an afterthought when designing the Model "A" chassis. Ford engineers did have it all sorted out by the time production started though.





Below is an era advertisement for the Houdaille shock absorber that Ford used on its prototypes. For the most part, these shock absorbers were used on large expensive motorcars. If I remember correctly, the Houdaille shock used on the prototypes cost \$100 per shock. So, they would have essentially doubled the price of the Model "A".



Luckily, Ford had Houdaille design a smaller version that was more reasonably priced for our cars. In 1931, a replacement shock for your Model "A" would have cost \$3 from the dealer not including installation. Since more than 20 million units were produced, they are common to run across at swap meets today. I don't know about you, but I don't normally carry the standards with me whenever I'm out and about. So, I have some rules of thumb whenever I'm looking at shocks to determine approximately what year they are. Below is a photo of a set of 1929 shocks. The first design sported a flat outer cover, and small mounting ears. In 1928, the outer cover generally had the Ford script stamped into it. Whereas in 1929, the script was not present. Just remember, a flat cover means an earlier shock.





Beginning in 1930, the outer cover was redesigned with an indentation to provide a better seal around the shaft. At left is an example of this cover on my 1931 shock. The mounting ears were also redesigned in 1931 to be more triangular in shape which provided more strength. So, if you see an indented cover, think 1930 or 1931. Also, the later the shock, the more patent numbers that are present.

You may also notice the "AC" stamped on my 1931 shock. That stands for "Anti-Clockwise" which tells me this is either a left front or right rear shock. This means the shock has 40% of the resistance when the arm rotates clockwise (up) and 60% of the resistance when the arm rotates anti-clockwise (down). In other words, the traverse spring returns to its original position more slowly than it was compressed upwards, hence absorbing the shock. Right front or left rear shocks could have been marked with a "CW" for "Clockwise". Not all shocks were marked "AC" or "CW". Regardless, it is important to make sure the shocks are installed correctly. Otherwise, they will not perform as designed.

As you're looking for shocks, it's important to remember there were four manufacturers: Houdaille Engineer Corp, National Acme Company, Spicer Manufacturing Company, and Ford Motor Company. Ford only made shocks in 1931, and they really don't seem to be that common. The two previous examples I gave above are National Acme shocks. If you are wanting a set for show, then all four shocks should match on your car. (continued on page 4)

There are a lot more details we could delve into on shock absorbers, and perhaps we will someday in another article. For now, hopefully you have some good rules of thumb to follow if you're looking. As for me, I'm always looking. Just do me a favor and don't tell Julianna! Ha! I want to leave you with one thing to always remember: All Model "A" Ford shocks said "HOUDAILLE HYDRAULIC SUSPENSION MADE IN U.S.A." If you're at a swap meet, and the shock you're looking at does not say these words specifically, then the shock is not an original Model "A" shock.



As I write this, I'm thinking of our Spring Tour coming up soon to Lawton. Traveling seems to suit many of us as we enjoy hitting the road in motorcars almost 100 years old. But we really have it pretty good these days with fairly nice roads, good hotels and many of us with air conditioning in our cars. I'm reminded of a trip my dad took in a Model A Ford coupe with a rumble seat and with three other guys in 1932 to see the Olympic Games in California. They were all Eagle Scouts, 20 years old and each had \$30 for their three week trip. They traveled 5,550 miles and visited many National Parks along the way. 


# MAY 4TH, 8:30 A.M. APPLE BARREL CAFE

The Gathering Place in Tulsa is the newest incredible park to visit and explore in the U.S. The Gathering Place has been named the Best City Park in the country by USA Today for a second time.

It was designed by the same brilliant landscape architect who created Maggie Daley Park in Chicago and Brooklyn Bridge Park in New York.

This park has the ability to make Tulsa a "bucket list" travel destination for families across the United States.

Currently the Gathering Place is 66 acres of park space. There are two additional phases still in progress which will bring the size of the Gathering Place to about 100 acres!

We will need a car count but will leave a few extra spaces just in case. Kendall will be our tour guide and that will last about an hour.


